AAUW Oshkosh, (virtual) Branch meeting

March 23, 2021

Meeting/ Program began at 7:00 p.m.

Program: *"The Global Context of the COVID-19 Pandemic"* Presented by Angela Subulwa and Alicia Johnson.

After the presentation, Alicia sent out a powerpoint that summarized the most important aspects of AAUW's priorities and recent scholarship.

Other notes on the pandemic part of the presentation:

The term "vaccine apartheid" has been used to refer to inequities in the availability and offering of vaccine across the world. For instance, African citizens participated in the testing of the vaccines, but

the country has been basically priced out of the market for purchasing doses. Prices per dose vary greatly by geographic region, Ten nations have administered 75% of the current vaccine supply, while in 130 countries, not a single dose of any vaccine has been administered.

There are multiple negative impacts of the pandemic evidenced across the globe, even apart from the many fatalities and continuing health problems. For example, during the pandemic, access to contraception has been disrupted in many countries. This is expected to negatively impact the lives of women across the world. The problem of domestic violence has been intensified, due to unemployment and financial stress, crowding and lack of mobility, and isolation with abusers. Help is harder to get, children are spending much more time in the home, and in public areas there are generally fewer people about at any given time (meaning that few others are present to observe family interactions).

Following the program, the business meeting commenced. Alicia reported that the branch will be gaining three new members, including Bridget Oliver.

Oshkosh might be the host city for an upcoming state convention.
